Only one amateur golfer placed his drive inside Snead's all afternoon long. John Hand of Manchester's Hand Motors, the title sponsor, hit his ball to within five feet of the pin. When Snead stepped up to hit his shot, he quipped with a big smile, "You won't get mad if I put this inside yours, will you?" His ball landed about ten feet from the flagstick, but Hand made birdie with his own ball so Sam's wasn't needed.
